Dear Mr. Greenewald:

We have reviewed the enclosed document in consultation with the Joint Staff (JS) and Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). CIA has no objection to declassification in full. JS has declassified it in part. The excised information is exempt from declassification under Executive Order 13526, section 3.3(b)(5), which protects information that could be expected to reveal formally named or numbered U.S. military war plans that remain in effect, or reveal operational or tactical elements of prior plans that are contained in such active plans.

OSD stands as the appellate authority and will coordinate any appeals regarding this case. A written appeal must be filed within 60 days explaining the rationale for reversal of the decision. 

A. PURPOSE

(U) In conjunction with references (a) through (j) this Directive establishes policy, provides procedures, and assigns responsibilities for the planning, development, programing, direction, execution, and control of overt psychological operations conducted by the Department of Defense in peacetime and in contingencies short of declared war.

B. APPLICABILITY AND SCOPE

1. (U) This Directive applies to the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), the Military Departments, the Organization of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Unified and Specified Commands, and the Defense Agencies (hereafter referred to collectively as "DoD Components"). The term "U.S. Military Services," as used herein, refers to the Army, the Navy, the Air Force, the Marine Corps, and, in time of war, to the Coast Guard.

2. (U) It applies to all contracts with contractors or consultants engaged to support psychological operations and all agreements with U.S. Government agencies by which a DoD Component provides or receives support for psychological operations.

3. (U) Under E.O. 12333 (reference (a)), unattributed (covert) peacetime psychological operations are special activities that may be conducted or supported by a DoD Component only when specifically directed by the President.

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C. DEFINITIONS

I. (U) <u>Psychological Operations</u>. For purposes of this Directive, planned political, economic, military, and ideological activities directed towards foreign countries, organizations, and individuals in order to create emotions, attitudes, understanding, beliefs, or behavior favorable to the achievement of U.S. political and military objectives.


2. (U) <u>Contingencies short of declared war</u>. Situations determined by the Under Secretary of Defense for Policy in which lives of U.S. citizens or property of the U.S. Government or U.S. citizens or interests vital to U.S. national security are threatened.

D. POLICY

JS 3.3 (b)(5)

1. (C) It is DoD policy that psychological operations, which are an effective and essential instrument of national policy, shall be conducted by DoD Components and supported when undertaken by other U.S. Government agencies. Psychological operations are an integral part of military operations and, as such, they are an inherent responsibility of all military commanders.

2. In peacetime and contingencies short of war, other than for training, psychological operations shall be conducted pursuant only to an approved psychological operations program. Psychological operations shall be used to achieve the following objectives:



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3. (c) Psychological operations shall be conducted only against foreign states, populations, organizations, and individuals.

4. (6) Before psychological operations are conducted, consideration shall be given to any adverse effect the operation or the revelation of the operation may have.

5. (U) Approval for a psychological operations program shall not exceed 1 year unless specifically authorized.

E. RESPONSIBILITIES

JS 3.3(b)(5)

1. (U) The <u>Under Secretary of Defense for Policy</u>, or designee, the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Policy, shall:

a. (U) Act as principal advisor to the Secretary of Defense on psychological operations matters.

b. (U) Develop DoD psychological operations policy.

c. (U) Coordinate psychological operations policy, plans, and programs with other U.S. Government agencies.

d. (U) Evaluate the effectiveness of DoD psychological operations programs.

e. (U) Review and approve all psychological operations programs to be conducted during peacetime or in contingencies short of declared war.

2. (U) The <u>Assistant Secretaries of Defense (International Security</u> <u>Affairs)</u> and <u>(International Security Policy)</u>, in coordination with the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Policy, shall provide assistance and advice to the Joint Chiefs of Staff in the development of specific psychological operations programs affecting their geographical areas of responsibility.

3. (U) The <u>General Counsel</u>, <u>Department of Defense</u>, shall review all proposed psychological operations programs to be conducted in peacetime or during contingencies short of declared war.

4. (U) The <u>Secretaries of the Military Departments</u> shall develop and maintain programs, forces, and capabilities necessary to conduct and support psychological operations in peacetime and during contingencies short of declared war; and provide the resources needed to sustain these programs, forces, and capabilities.



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5. (U) The Joint Chiefs of Staff shall:

a. (U) Develop operational concepts, joint doctrine, and plans for conducting psychological operations.

b. (U) Incorporate psychological operations into military planning for peacetime operations and for contingencies short of declared war.

c. (U) Review the psychological operations plans and programs of commanders of Unified and Specified Commands to determine whether they are adequate and feasible.

d. (U) Provide for the direction of psychological operations conducted by commanders of Unified and Specified Commands.

e. (U) Maintain liaison on psychological operations plans, programs, operations, and activities with the armed forces of allied and friendly countries.

6. (U) The <u>Commanders of the Unified and Specified Commands</u>, in coordination with the chiefs of U.S. diplomatic missions, shall plan, support, and conduct in peacetime and in contingencies short of declared war psychological operations in support of U.S. regional objectives, policies, interests, and theater military missions.

7. (U) The Director, Defense Intelligence Agency, and the Director, National Security Agency/Chief, Central Security Service shall furnish support, as required.

F. EFFECTIVE DATE

(U) This Directive is effective immediately.
